In Chaffinch we have been enjoying settling in and getting to know our new friends and staff members. We have enjoyed collecting resources in the sensory garden for our Andy Goldsworthy art sculptures.

We have also explored some interesting sensory resources to help us learn all about Egyptian Pharaohs; going on classroom archaeological digs for treasure, wrapping mummies and examining how the Pharaohs used pictures rather than words in their writing.

The children had lots of messy fun when making our own papyrus using strips of paper soaked in water and glue. Next, we will be printing our names on them in hieroglyphs, just like the Pharaohs did.

In Design & Technology we are enjoying making our own hand puppets based on characters from The Gingerbread Man. We have been making choices in different methods to fix and fasten with lots of pinning, sewing and gluing keeping us busy. The children are really enjoying seeing their puppets near completion now and we are so proud of all their hard work.

At Willow Dene we have several children and staff who have severe nut allergies and who are at risk of anaphylaxis. Because of this we are a nut free school and are reminding

parents and staff not to send any food into school which contains nuts or nut products. We really appreciate you helping with this as it makes sure we can keep everybody safe.

#### **Woodlark Class**

We are Woodlark class. Welcome to our green fingered newsletter contribution!

We are an easy class to find...we are the first class next to the office at Swingate Lane. You may know already that we love our balcony garden. You will often find us outside, playing and learning. We care for our plants, water, tidy and recycle all the way through the year.

During the last year we made a video for Gardener's World and planted all sorts of growing things. We have attracted birds, bees, butterflies and a cat! We loved learning and relaxing outside in the warm weather and we celebrated the Platinum Jubilee with a balcony party. JJ plants bulbs in our garden and takes photographs of the flowers to turn into postcards. You can buy these on reception if you would like. All the money he earns goes towards the cost of his next crop of bulbs. At the moment he is choosing spring bulbs to plant before it gets too cold. Crocus, Alium, tulip? What to choose!

The Dahlia's we planted in the summer are still flowering and we have used them as gifts to take home and give to people who help us around the school. In September we harvested the last of our tomatoes and used them to make tomato cous-cous with our freshly grown basil! Abubaker is our sensory chef and made sure that we were mixing and adding the ingredients properly. We also harvested and dried our sunflower heads. We planted our sunflowers outside our balcony and Jodie and Isabella checked on them every day until they were ready to pick. We also sent one home for a sunflower growing competition. It was fun finding out what happened to the baby sunflowers we sent home. Eividas's sunflower grew to 127 cm tall and Tilly's one got stolen by a fox!

Now we have harvested our seeds and they are stored ready to make bird food for the winter. Inspired by Autumn Watch, and the idea of 'fake autumn' we have been collecting acorns, conkers and other tree seeds and fruits. JJ & TJ planted these with Cathie so hopefully they will start to grow in spring. Ezra collected and sent his Mum home some cuttings from our sensory garden and this inspired us to try growing our own cuttings in recycled plastic bottles and to collect fruit seeds from the fruit we eat to see if we can get them to grow. You will see our planting experiments on the windowsill in class.

This half term we have been collecting autumn leaves and tried some autumn art, making dreamcatchers to hang on our balcony tree and leaf animals. There are also lots of different pumpkins and squashes to explore (Jesse likes the tiny munchkin squashes in his standing frame bowl!). Eventually these will be added to our winter bird food so that our bird friends still visit when the weather gets cold. What next we hear you ask? We have been planning an extension to our balcony since the summer term...Our city garden will be a peaceful place for people to sit and look at our balcony and to hear us playing. We planted flowering plants including roses and jasmine. Dave helped us build and paint a bench and we chose cushions and an outdoor rug. Cathie helped us choose a birdbath and Joanna is making us some stained glass to help us remember some of our friends. When it is finished we hope people will come and sit and think and relax.

What next? Lily will be joining us in class after half term. We are looking forward to showing her our balcony, planting our winter tubs and using natural materials to decorate our tree. People visit all the time to see what we're up to outside. We have made a lots of friends and received some amazing ideas of what to plant and gifts of seeds, plants and garden ornaments. You are welcome any time if you would like to visit us.

# TRANSITION Webinar

In healthcare, we use the word "transition" to describe the process of preparing, planning and moving from children's to adult services.

Transition is about making plans with you – and not about you.

We understand that moving away from a team of doctors and nurses that you have been with for many years may feel scary. Most young people find that by getting involved in the transition process early, they feel more confident and happier about the move.

To support families and young people with complex medical needs and learning disabilities through the transition period, health professionals from Lewisham and Greenwich NHS Trust and Oxleas NHS Trust are working together with leads from Education and Social Care. Do you have a young person between the ages of 14 to 18 who currently attends a special school in the boroughs of Lewisham, Greenwich or Bexley? If so we invite you to join us online on **Tuesday 25 October at 6pm** to hear how the transition process is run for health, education and social care and what you can expect from your teams during this time.
