They aim to 'get under the skin' of the school by asking complex questions and gathering a lot of information. The report is now on our website if you would like to read it. Moreover, we met and bonded with likeminded professionals from other outstanding special schools and will be paying reciprocal visits to each other in the coming months. We are delighted with the outcome that Willow Dene has been graded as a 'leading' school and would like to share one of our favourite quotes from the report:

'The relationships between school staff, pupils and their families are fantastic. When pupils come into school in the morning, trusting relationships between staff and pupils are evident. For example, in the pouring winter rain, each taxi van takes it's place outside reception and a stream of staff quickly help the pupils unload and welcome them into school with bright and welcoming voices to start the school day'.

While our reviewers were here they were able to see some of our Careers Week activities and find out more about some of our Key Stage 3 specialist interests and how we identify and grow our children's passions and strengths as they get older. Children had a lot of fun designing their own app during this Careers Week and we were amazed at some of their ideas.



### **WILLOWDENE COMMUNITY COMMITTEE**

Early in 2022 a flyer dropped through my letter box, inviting local residents to an Open Morning at Willow Dene School. As a retired teacher and psychotherapist, I thought it would be interesting to learn more about a school that is literally on my doorstep. I really had little idea of how they operated. The Open Morning changed all that. I was blown away by the breadth, variety and expertise that they provided to some of the most vulnerable children in our community, i.e., those with severe physical disabilities and /or those with developmental disorders. No wonder their latest Ofsted inspection rated them as "Outstanding".

I was very happy, therefore, (and a little surprised!) to find myself invited to my first community committee meeting that very evening. The committee meets at least once each term and comprises two Deputy Heads and four other local residents with a variety of experiences and knowledge. The committee is part of Willow Dene's extensive inclusion policy, which encourages local and wider community involvement, including local residents and businesses (e.g. Morrisons). This can be seen in the Open Day tours, community events such as last term's Winter Wonderland, and the forthcoming Spring Fling, as well as in the Community Newsletter and access to the school's website.

The community committee contributes a local perspective in respect of the planning and feedback involved in the above activities and can generate ideas about how to further encourage local involvement in the school, e.g., a Community Library box in Swingate Lane. They can also provide direct discussion with other local residents they meet, for example when delivering Willow Dene flyers and newsletters. Local views on the school can then be fed back via the committee, or residents can be encouraged to attend Open Days and fund raising events, or to visit the school's website to learn more about what a world-class educational resource they have on their doorstep. Educationalists from all over the world visit Willow Dene to learn more about the provision of specialist education. This two-way communication between local residents and school can also enable the school to hear what concerns the residents may have about things like parking, etc.

Committee members can also contribute their own experiences of issues connected with children and their families in receipt of special educational provision. For example, I am particularly interested in the extensive plans the school has to encourage sibling involvement and a sense of pride in the way they manage having a brother or sister with special educational needs. As a family therapist I saw only too vividly how the siblings' needs could be overlooked, with dire consequences to their mental health and family relationships.

I am always impressed by the way my fellow committee members contribute their particular areas of knowledge and experience to ideas about community involvement, including education, marketing, and charity work. I think we all share a commitment to enabling two-way communication between the community and Willow Dene, so that both are more fully aware and informed about what each has to offer the other.
