Following the announcement that planning has been granted for the new sixth form building during the spring holidays, we are very happy and excited to confirm that there will be a sixth form at Oakmere Road in September.

We are even more excited that we are taking forward all of the young people in our current Year 11 and not just some of them. We have a lot of work to do this term to be ready for September but are confident that everything the children need will be in place. We are planning on meeting with the parents of Willow Dene's first ever sixth form cohort next half term. The building work will be starting imminently at Oakmere Road and we will be keeping you updated of the progress.



Making New Friends

Willow Dene continues to be a school of interest. This half term we are expecting visits from Mary Rose School in Portsmouth and Waverley School in London. They are joining us for a tour of Willow Dene and to look at different aspects of our practice, including how we teach phonics and early reading, how we work with therapists and our specialist teams and our curriculum.

We are particularly looking forward to welcoming colleagues from Mary Rose School, as their Headteacher was one of our reviewers on the Challenge Partners team. They have a similar cohort of children to us and we are looking forward to a reciprocal visit to Portsmouth to see their sixth form.

We are very excited to welcome a group of school leaders from Africa to Willow Dene later this term. Having read about Willow Dene on our website, they contacted us to see if we would be able to host a placement for a group of leaders at Willow Dene. They will be joining us to work alongside us and experience the day-to-day life of our school for 13 days in June. We hope that during that time they will meet with parents too and possibly attend one of the coffee mornings. Following their placement with us they will be visiting the Autism Show in Birmingham before flying back to Africa.



This week we had our MOVE Accreditation visit. The MOVE Programme is an activity-based framework that enables disabled young people to gain independent sitting, standing, walking and

transferring skills and forms the basis for the way we teach all our children and young people who are learning mobility skills. From learning how to be in different positions to head control, activity and movement skills like sitting and standing, our provision reflects the principals and values of MOVE.

As such, we have been a MOVE Centre of Excellence for several years and we are very proud of this. The reaccreditation, which happens every three years involves a lot of preparation for the full day visit, as we have to evidence how we apply each of the MOVE standards to our daily life in school. We also had a lot of exciting new innovations to share with the accrediting team. We look forward to sharing the outcome of the visit with you soon.

Kingswood School Journey

19th - 21st April 2023



On Wednesday 19th April, we set off on our first post-pandemic school journey. It was four years coming, and the day had finally arrived! Our well-rehearsed (if somewhat rusty) plans went into action and we loaded up the van and minibuses with kit, luggage, and most importantly, people. Nineteen children from ten classes across the school, along with a hard-working team of Willow Dene's best. We waved goodbye to our friends and support team at school and set off, with much beeping of horns, heading down the A2 to Shorne Country Park.

Once there, we wasted no time in finding the adventure playground and exploring the equipment and getting to know each other. Then it was time for a picnic, and we all had a good lunch before loading the buses back up and setting off for Kingswood. Before we knew it, we were there, unloading our cases into our bedrooms for the next two days. Our activity schedule kicked off with archery, all together at the bottom of the field, which gave us an opportunity to see some of the site and the things we would be doing. Much loading of arrows and aiming at targets ensued... and bullseye! (Or somewhere close, at least). We topped off the day with a campfire with some excellent silly songs and delicious sticky s'mores.

After a good night's sleep (or some sleep, at least!), Thursday dawned with a packed day ahead of us. We were organised in two 'lines', each with a slightly different programme, but these are some of the things we got up to:

Environmental art – collecting natural materials and making faces from the things we had found, topped off with an impromptu karaoke session!

3G Swing – harnessed up, we pulled our friends up to giddying heights, before releasing them to plummet and sway.

Scrapheap challenge – we created crazy items to wear out of cardboard then had fun with a building contest.

Laser tag – we ran (and sneaked) around a concrete jungle, trying to get the other team (or anyone who crossed our path), hid around corners and sniped through windows.

Crate stack – we donned harnesses and helmets to ascend an ever-higher and ever-wobblier tower of crates before the whole lot inevitably came crashing down.

Fencing – with masks and foils, we cried 'en-guard' and parried towards each other, as the clash of blades rang out.

Obstacle course - climbing, crawling and balancing, through, over and under a range of hurdles.

Somewhere in the midst of that we fitted in an all-important lunch and dinner to keep our energy levels high, then finished off a busy day with a relaxing **Movie Night**. The popcorn flowed as we watched the winning film in our vote: Monsters Inc. As the credits rolled, sleepy children (and staff) headed back to their rooms for a shower and sleep.

Friday arrived and we didn't let the drizzle dampen our spirits. After a hearty breakfast, one group headed off for **shelter building** and after constructing tepees from strong branches, they were draped in tarpaulins for some much-needed cover from the rain. Meanwhile, the other line headed to the tower for **abseiling**. Bravery abounded as children ascended to the top pf the 10-metre platform, then carefully lowered themselves back to the ground. Then it was time for the finale: the **zip-wire**. Yet again, children impressed us with their courage and trust. There were lots of cheers of encouragement as children whizzed down the wire and equally loud applause for our staff that wanted a go. There were lots of requests for more (some while they were still in mid-air).

That was it! All over for another year, except for a quick lunch and piling back into the minibuses (which had been magically loaded) to head back to school, eager to see our families. As always, after the incredible amount of planning and work that goes into a successful school journey, the trip itself left us humbled and grateful that we work with such an amazing and great bunch of children and such fantastic, kind staff. Without the unwavering support and hard work of staff who volunteer for school journey, it simply would not be possible, so a huge thank you to each and every one of them, as well as the extensive support team back at school who help in ways big and small to ensure everything goes smoothly.
